A Message From Our Outgoing President.

As my current term of three years as President of the Society for Women and the Civil War is coming to an end, I am stepping down from my leadership role and will move to an At-Large role on The Board of Directors.

The Society has accomplished much in the past three years. The Board moved to a monthly meeting schedule to handle new and old business in a timely manner, and we adopted new by-laws for our organization. (These by-laws are published on the Members Only page of our website.)

My biggest goal as President was to improve on the myriad aspects of our organization. We revamped our website and added multiple informative new webpages. We also reimagined and expanded our quarterly journal, *At Home and in the Field*, to make it more dynamic and relevant to the interests of our membership. And our membership has more than doubled! We also expanded our monthly e-newsletter, *The Calling Card*, which is currently distributed to more than 2,000 readers monthly, thanks to our outreach initiatives.

During my tenure, the Society produced two annual conferences, *Rebuilding Lives After the War* in 2018, and *Women of the Peninsula* in 2019. We planned a conference for 2020, but unfortunately had to cancel it due to the Covid-19 pandemic. We are now in the midst of producing a conference in 2021, *Women of the Shenandoah Valley*.

The Society is also hard at work on our signature database, the *National Registry of Women's Service in the Civil War*. This is a huge undertaking, and we are proud of this effort. The searchable database currently has nearly 4,000 names, with more to come. The Registry will be available soon on our website.

I am grateful for all the enthusiasm and support I received as President, and I thank the membership and the Board for their expertise and cooperation in achieving our goals for both the organization at large, and for our annual conference.

National Register of Women's Service in the Civil War (NRWSCW): <u>Woman of the Month</u>

Lydia Maria Francis Child

Writer, Educator, Women's Rights Activist and Abolitionist, United States of America




Born February 11, 1802, in Medford, Massachusetts; Died October 20, 1880, in Wayland, MA; Buried in North Cemetery, Wayland, MA.

Lydia Maria Child was a writer, editor of a children's journal, and a teacher. She was a dedicated abolitionist, an activist for the rights of women and Native Americans, and an opponent of American expansionism.

Her 1828 manual and cookbook, *The American Frugal Housewife*, was an immensely influential basic reference for homemakers. In 1833, her book, *An Appeal in Favor of That Class of Americans Called Africans*, was the first antislavery book printed in America. In 1834, she published *The Girl's Own Book*, the contents of which can be considered a precursor to the Girl Scout Handbook. That book and her other popular works, *The Mother's Book*, and *The Family Nurse* remain in print today and serve as excellent references for living historians and reenactors.

Of all of her writings, including during the Civil War, she is most known for the poem *Over the River and Through the Wood,* which was composed

for inclusion in the 1844 book *Flowers for Children*, Volume 2. It has two variations: one for Thanksgiving and one for Christmas. The composer of the music for the poem is unknown. We offer it here for your seasonal pleasure.



Over the River and Through the Wood

Over the river, and through the wood, To Grandfather's house we go; the horse knows the way to carry the sleigh through the white and drifted snow.

Over the river, and through the wood, to Grandfather's house away! We would not stop for doll or top, for 'tis Christmas Day.

Over the river, and through the wood oh, how the wind does blow! It stings the toes and bites the nose as over the ground we go. Over the river, and through the wood and straight through the barnyard gate, We seem to go extremely slow, it is so hard to wait!

Over the river, and through the wood— When Grandmother sees us come, She will say, "O, dear, the children are here, bring a pie for everyone."

Over the river, and through the wood now Grandmother's cap I spy! Hurrah for the fun! Is the pudding done? Hurrah for the pumpkin pie!

Over the river, and through the wood, with a clear blue winter sky, The dogs do bark, and children hark, as we go jingling by.

Over the river, and through the wood, to have a first-rate play. Hear the bells ring, "Ting-a-ling-ding!", Hurrah for Christmas Day!

Over the river, and through the wood, no matter for winds that blow; Or if we get the sleigh upset into a bank of snow Over the river, and through the wood, to see little John and Ann; We will kiss them all, and play snow-ball and stay as long as we can.

Over the river, and through the wood, trot fast, my dapple-gray! Spring over the ground like a hunting-hound! For 'tis Christmas Day.
