

Godey's Lady's Book

Godey's Lady's Book was an American magazine published by Louis Godey from 1830 - 1878. Sarah Josepha Hale was the editor from 1837 - 1877. The magazine was sold in 1877, and the name changed to Godey's Magazine. It ceased publication in 1896. Best known for the hand-tinted fashion plates in each issue, Godey's also published poetry and articles of wide-ranging content. Beginning in 1852, Godey's included the monthly feature "Employment for Women." As the most-read 19th century publication for women, designed to both entertain and educate, Godey's is a premier source for the study of 19th century American women.

Woman of the Month

Mary Jewett Telford

Nurse, USA



Born March 18, 1839 in Seneca, New York Died August 5, 1906 in Hinsdale, Illinois Buried at South Perinton Cemetery in Perinton, New York


Mary Jewett was one of nine children born to Dr. Lester Jewett and his wife Hannah. Her family moved from New York State to Lima, Michigan in 1846. Not much is known about Mary's childhood, but she clearly was educated. At the age of 14, she began teaching in the local school district in Llma.

When the Civil War broke out, two of Mary's brothers enlisted in the Union Army, and Mary began her campaign to become a nurse. Initially denied because she was deemed too young, she pleaded to the Governor of Michigan, a family friend, and his influence landed her a nursing position at Hospital No. 8 in Nashville, Tennessee.

Mary stayed at her post for a year. For eight months, she was the only woman at the 600 patient hospital. One of her patients was Jacob Telford of the 15th Indiana Infantry, who had been gravely wounded at Stones River. Jacob recovered his wounds and was discharged from the army, while Mary was forced to leave nursing due to ill-health and exhaustion.

Mary and Jacob married on July 8, 1864. They adopted two girls who had been orphaned by the war. The family lived in Michigan and Iowa before settling in Denver, Colorado in 1873. Mary helped support her family by writing and editing. She was a charter member of the Women's Relief Corps (an auxiliary of the Grand Army of the Republic), and she also became involved in the Temperance Movement. She was granted a Nurses Pension in 1892.

Jacob died in 1905, and Mary passed away the following year.
