

SWCW is honored to be hosting our 23rd Conference at USAHEC.

The U.S. Army Heritage and Education Center engages, inspires, and informs the Army, the American people, and global partners with a unique and enduring source of education and thought. The Center maintains the knowledge repositories that support scholarship and research about the U.S. Army and its operating environment. USAHEC is open to the public for research, and includes a premier museum with changing exhibits.

The extensive USAHEC archival collection includes unit histories, oral histories, soldier diaries, training manuals, extensive photographs, and more than 400,000 books and 70,000 objects.



The Army Heritage Trail, the outdoor museum of USAHEC, encompasses about one mile and highlights nearly every era of Army history with exhibits and artifacts. Designed to provide an immersion experience that allows the visitor to walk into each period represented, the Trail also serves as a stage for living history presentations by historians serving as interpreters. For the Civil War period, the Heritage Trail offers cabins and a section of the Antietam Battlefield. During the second day of the 2023 conference, seven unit and individual impressions will be offered on the Trail.


Travel the Oregon Trail!



Women of the Month

The Nancy Harts

All-Woman Militia, CSA

In 1861, the women of LaGrange, Georgia watched the majority of their men -nearly 1,300 -- march off to war. Recognizing that their town was strategically
located on a rail line halfway between Atlanta, Georgia and Montgomery, Alabama,
the citizens were concerned about a Union attack. Nancy Hill Morgan, the wife of a
departing Confederate officer, decided to form an all-woman militia to defend their
town.


Along with her friend Mary Heard, Nancy Morgan recruited relatives, friends, and former schoolmates to form The Nancy Harts, named after the famed Revolutionary War fighter. Armed with a copy of William Hardee's *Rifle and Light Infantry Tactics*, as well as the assistance of a local man who was too disabled to serve in the army, The Nancy Harts rounded up muskets and pistols and taught themselves to drill like regular infantry soldiers. Over the course of the war, the 40-strong militia drilled twice a week, practiced their marksmanship, and formed themselves into a disciplined unit. They elected Nancy Morgan as their captain.

In April 1865, Union troops raided West Georgia, and the town of LaGrange received a telegraph that nearby West Point was under siege. The Nancy Harts quickly formed and marched to the LaGrange Female College on the edge of town. They were prepared to battle as a column of 3,000 Union soldiers approached the town. Captain Morgan went forward to negotiate with the commanding Union officer (who, no doubt, had no wish to engage the women). She agreed to surrender her town on the condition that Union troops spare all civilians and homes. The Colonel agreed to her terms and Morgan surrendered LaGrange. The Nancy Harts saved their town without firing a single shot. The Union troops kept their word and left homes untouched, but destroyed Confederate warehouses and rail lines.

The Nancy Harts disbanded at the conclusion of the war.
